The Inman Park Neighborhood Association Makes Strides

I have friends in St. Paul and Minneapolis, and fortunately these friends invite me up to visit during our hot summer months. In July, while out for a walk to enjoy their refreshing summer temperatures, I stopped to consider that I hadn't once tripped due to any hazardous conditions on their sidewalks. I asked my friends who has to maintain the sidewalks, and I learned that in each city, it's the responsibility of the homeowner. Both of the Twin Cities strictly enforce the ordinance.

Here in Inman Park, where homeowners are also responsible for sidewalks, IPNA works very hard to further sidewalk improvements. With a grant from the City in 2002, IPNA embarked on a program to provide subsidies for homeowners who choose to address sidewalk problems. By mid-2016, over 150 sidewalks had been repaired or replaced. Today, Millie Astin, chair of our Sidewalks Committee, supported by the Lifelong Inman Park Committee, which is chaired by Cathie Berger, continues to monitor the condition of our sidewalks.

During a 2016 audit conducted by Lifelong committee members Marge Hays and Sandy Hoke, 101 sidewalks were found to be in need of replacement, while 157 needed some level of repair. Eleven of those sidewalks identified were replaced before the City unexpectedly changed its construction guidelines to require a four-inch concrete underlayment instead of the four inches of substrate

On the Streets Where We Live

After wondering for years how our Inman Park neighborhood streets got their names, I decided to research the topic. This is the first of several articles in which I'll share my findings. Sources include long-time IP residents, former neighbor and historian Tommy Jones' "History and Architecture of Inman Park" (9/1992), former neighbor Sharon Foster Jones and Christine V. Marr's "Images of America – INMAN PARK" (2008), IPNA's archives, and numerous materials from the James G. Kenan Research Center at the Atlanta History Center. Citations are not included in order to save space. Some name origins have more than one explanation; some have none. Should you have different or more complete information, please email me! This month I will discuss the naming of Inman Park and Edgewood Avenue.

HOW THE NEIGHBORHOOD GOT ITS NAME

Inman Park, "the city's first successful planned garden suburb," was initially named East Atlanta Park. It was renamed c.1887 due to Samuel M. Inman's financial and political assistance.

Developer "Joel Hurt named his development Inman Park, in honor of Samuel M. Inman (1843-1915), the man Henry Grady called 'first citizen of Atlanta.' Samuel M. Inman was a railroad magnate & was Joel Hurt's friend and associate on the electric street railway system. Samuel M. Inman and Company was one of the largest cotton brokerage houses in the world during the late nineteenth century and Samuel Inman was one of Hurt's major backers. In addition, next to Hurt and his wife, Samuel's uncle Walker P. Inman was the largest stockholder in the East Atlanta Land Company. The

previously allowed. This change stalled the project temporarily due to the dramatically increased costs construction would entail. After a series of meetings with the City, IPNA now once again has approval to continue using the substrate. In the remaining months of 2018, plans call for replacing eight sidewalks on Euclid, twelve on Colquitt, eight on Lake Avenue, and about ten additional sidewalks spread throughout the neighborhood.

Along with the normal wear and tear that damages sidewalks, many of our problems are unfortunately caused by the roots of our beautiful street trees. While the Twin Cities have hundreds of large, stately trees arching over their streets, the space allowed in their planting strips is several times wider than that provided here, giving more space for roots to grow. Since trees and sidewalks need to get along in the planting space provided here, our Tree Watch Committee, chaired by Jim Abbot, works in conjunction with the Sidewalks and Lifelong Committees. Changes initiated by this synergistic combo include planting better suited trees, such as ginkgo and eastern redbud, with roots systems that don't harm sidewalks. To accommodate a few larger trees such as cathedral live oaks, sidewalks are now narrowed, creating tree wells to allow more room for a healthy root system.

With paved surfaces, stormwater runoff is also a big problem and is in fact the largest source of pollution in our rivers and streams. But Chattahoochee Riverkeeper and Trees Atlanta are now including our neighborhood in a joint initiative, "Green Streets and Clean Streams." Through this program, Inman Park will receive upgrades to two traffic bulb-outs at the corner of North Highland and Washita Avenue, converting them to planters that will capture and clean runoff. These systems will provide more space and water than a traditional right-of-way so the trees will have better access to the resources they need. Water sensors in the planters will provide data on water quality, creating a learning tool for further improving stormwater management. To learn more about the planters, check the IPNA website for dates on upcoming public workshops and demonstrations, and come to IPNA meetings for further updates on progress.

To help IPNA continue to address the interrelated problems of broken sidewalks, unhealthy trees, and contaminated waterways, contact the Sidewalks, Lifelong, or Tree Watch Committee chairs. Introducing the Little 5 Points Halloween Parade Grand Marshal 2018

This year's Little Points Halloween Parade Grand Marshal is David Simpson. He insisted on sharing the spotlight with the memory of Holly Mull, because he says, "it's more about her than it is about me because she was the force behind getting it organized." David had the idea for a Halloween Parade for years before he approached Holly about organizing it. He felt that "Halloween should be our holiday; it really fits us more than anywhere else. We are the wacky, unusual



community where people dress in odd ways on a daily basis, so it's a perfect fit for our little neighborhood."

David and Holly began planning the first Halloween Parade in 2001. Just six weeks before that parade, 9-11 occurred. David remembers, "we considered not having it because everyone was so traumatized by it, but we decided to go forward in resistance to that event. In honor of the first responders who died, we chose members of Atlanta Fire Department as Grand Marshals." Holly continued to organize the parade until her untimely passing, just ten days before the Halloween Parade in 2010.

David, a 12th generation Georgia native from Athens, started his business, Coyote Trading, on Seminole Avenue in 1988 and moved to his current location on Moreland Avenue in 1992 (one of only two businesses to occupy that space in the past 40 years). He moved his business to L5P because "it's a progressive community, and because of the creative energy, the diversity in an area of entrepreneurship." David feels "the main importance of the Halloween Parade to the businesses is that it helps brand our neighborhood and has a year-long benefit."

The Little 5 Points Halloween Festival and Parade are on Saturday, October 20. The event is the one-and-only annual fundraiser by the Little 5 Points Business Association, a non-profit organization that works to promote and protect the L5P community. David has been a Little 5 Points Business Association (L5PBA) member for over 25 years, serving on the Board off and on during that time. He will be seen in the parade in his official capacity as Grand Marshal being towed by a tractor with his two kids and seven grandkids.

first lots were auctioned in Inman Park in May 1889...By the end of 1891 there were twenty houses built or under construction."

EDGEWOOD AVENUE

"De Kalb County acquired two new post offices during 1878, Edgewood, for which the well-known avenue in Atlanta was later named...."

Hurt called Edgewood Avenue "the equal of such prominent residential avenues as Drexel in Chicago or Euclid in Cleveland."

"A portion of the road was originally Line Street between Peachtree Road and Pryor Street because it ran as 'straight as an arrow' on the land lot line separating Atlanta's northern and southern business districts in the late 19th century. Joel Hurt built the streetcar line before the street emerged to connect the Equitable Building with his new development - Inman Park. The street railway opened August 22, 1889. Hurt took his naming opportunity from the fact that the community of Edgewood existed before his streetcar venture on the eastern edge of Atlanta. The town of Edgewood, 4 miles east of Atlanta, was incorporated on December 9, 1889, and annexed by the city on January 1, 1909."


We at the Yacht Club feel like it's time for us to become a non-smoking establishment, following many other Atlanta restaurants. This decision is what is best for our employees, as well as our patrons. We will now ask our patrons to step outside to smoke.



As a little background, the

Georgia Smokefree Air Act of 2005 does not apply to bars and restaurants that deny access to any person under the age of 18 and that do not employ individuals under the age of 18. Many bars and restaurants in Georgia that fall into this exempt category have chosen to ban smoking as part of their own policy.

# Inman Middle School Thrives with Continued Support from Our Community

As another great academic year begins at Inman – our second under the outstanding leadership of Dr. Kevin Maxwell – we are proud to report that the Inman Middle School Foundation experienced a record year in 2017/2018, raising nearly \$100,000 that was put to direct and immediate use in our Inman classrooms. The Inman Foundation is a non-profit organization supporting initiatives that fall under two primary elements of the school's Strategic Plan: Systems & Resources and Talent Management.

Thanks to the generosity of Inman families, neighborhood businesses and organizations, and other community members during the last two school years, the Foundation has succeeded in funding:

More than 250 Chromebooks supporting the 1:1 initiative to provide every Inman student with his or her own dedicated Chromebook in the classroom.

"A Chromebook in every student's hand individualizes student learning with endless access to online resources, each that cater to different interests, comprehension, and vocabulary levels. Additionally, Google integration provides classrooms limitless opportunities for collaboration and creation through powerful apps," instructional coach Sarrita Allen said.

"Kids love technology. But they are using the device to create, curate, evaluate, and synthesize info," Dr. Maxwell said. "The Foundation understands how technology can be a vehicle for students to be engaged in the classroom."

A highly effective in-school tutoring partnership with the Educational Advisory Foundation, bringing experienced and highly trained outside educators to work one-on-one or in small groups during school hours providing intensive instruction in reading and math for students who require extra attention. The EAF program effectively reduces class sizes by allowing teachers to continue instruction for students not in the program at a pace appropriate to their level.

"We've seen statistically significant increases in test scores with those students. It's definitely working," Maxwell said.

Level 1 Google Certification for 30 teachers which leads to improved efficiency among teaching teams when the same learning platform is utilized in addition to gifted certification training for 14 teachers, which helps keep all class sizes smaller and permits greater flexibility in teacher assignments.

"I love the benefits of Google Classroom. No more stacks of paper. You can see a single kid's entire workflow. It keeps families informed and you see real-time progress." said 6th Grade Science teacher, Melissa Nunnink.

Although the Foundation has made significant progress, it has not yet fully attained all objectives. Inman still needs approximately 300 Chromebooks to reach the 1:1 goal. The Foundation has also committed to continuing the EAF tutoring program this year and providing additional gifted and Google certifications.


