
We have had an incredible show of support from local merchants who understand the value of reaching out to our neighborhood through the Advocator. Now it's up to all of us to show them our support!



Local Meetings to Address L5P Nightclub

Crave, the nightclub operating at 1126 Euclid Avenue, has asked to come before the Little Five Points Business Association in January as they begin to pursue the issuance of a permanent liquor license. Their temporary license expires in early February. There are indications that their attorney, Ed Rucker, may also ask to come before IPNA at our January 15 meeting. IPNA has received word that he expects Crave's application to be voted against overwhelmingly by the members present at the L5P and Inman Park meetings, and also to be voted down by the board of NPU-N. There are also indications that Crave's attorney then intends to proceed anyway to the Atlanta License Review Board meeting in the first half of February to ask that local opposition to Crave be disregarded and to ask the License Review Board to approve his client's flawed liquor license application, just as they did for the same client a few years ago for Escobar on Peters Street.

There have been many complaints from Inman Park neighbors regarding this club's extremely late operating hours and the loud noise from Crave. IPNA will keep members informed about the status of the application. Please watch for the January IPNA agenda and be ready to come to the January 15 IPNA meeting and voice your opinion. We will also need neighbors to turn out for the NPU-N meeting and for the License Review Board Meeting, and we'll keep you informed regarding those dates and times. Neighbors around Crave have called police multiple times regarding the noise. As Public Safety VP Kevin Curry pointed out, these complaints should be on record and should have a bearing on the approval process. Any documentation neighbors can supply at the meetings will be helpful.



Hello from the L5PCAC

Greetings from the Little Five Points Center for Arts and Community (L5PCAC). Most people know us as the Community Center. The Center building is celebrating 101 years of existence in the Inman Park community. Starting out as the Moreland Elementary School, the building has evolved into a Community Center that is open to everyone who may want to get involved with one of our resident partner organizations. When it was leased to WRFG 89.3 FM (the international community radio station housed in the Center) in 1984, the building began to change, as more tenants moved their offices and businesses here, many of whom have been housed here for nearly 35 years.

One of the organizations which houses in the building is Homes of Light a nonprofit agency that has assisted over 750 individuals to become self sufficient through employment programs called Alliance Employment. As a way of generating revenue to support this wonderful program, Homes of Light has started a junk removal service called Alliance. Speak for the Trees: Best Trees of 2019

As I write, critics are naming the best films, books, and dating apps of 2019. Not to be left out, I present you with my picks for best neighborhood trees of the year!

- 10. Sugarberry (Celtis laevigata) in Freedom Park, between Sinclair and N. Highland. Co-champion for this species in the ATL, this tree's gracefully cascading lower branches had to be trimmed recently to discourage camping.
- 9. Southern Red Oak (Quercus falcata), 954 Dekalb. Years ago, it was slated for removal due to construction at Marble Lofts. A heroic homeowner saved it.
- 8. Sourwood (Oxydendrum arboreum) in Springvale Park near the north steps. This is a personal favorite for its blocky bark and extraordinary fall color: eye-popping crimson.
- 7. Dawn Redwood (Metasequoia glyptostroboides), 803 Lake. With a history reaching back to the dinosaurs, this supposedly extinct species was rediscovered in the 1940s.
- 6. Willow Oak (Quercus phellos), behind 951 Edgewood. This is a monster tree, folks, and getting bigger every minute.
- 5. Weeping Katsuras (Cercidiphyllum japonicum), 956 Euclid. Easily the most elegant trees in the 'hood.
- 4. White Oak (Quercus alba), 100 Waverly Way. Classic cottage + stately shade tree = absolute perfection.
- 3. Water Oak (Quercus nigra), 320 N. Highland. It's 14 feet in circumference, and it's way prettier than a parking deck.
- 2. Live Oaks (Quercus virginiana), 145 Elizabeth. Joel Hurt dearly loved this species, despite its not being native to the Piedmont. More than a century later, these are our "signature" trees.



IPNA Meeting December 18, 2019 Minutes

President Beverly Miller called the IPNA meeting to order at 7:32 p.m.

Welcome and Introduction of Newcomers: None.

Police Officers' Reports

Sgt Soukup reported that they are increasing patrol hours again (in tandem with increased holiday activity) and reminded us again to always empty your car, to always call the police to report a crime (however small) and to share information when you have it; a video of even a theft from your porch may help solve multiple crimes in the 'hood.

Motion to approve November Meeting Minutes. Seconded. Approved.

Announcements

Al Caproni and Chris Curley [Little 5 Points Alliance] – Reported on the continued development of the "Euclid Avenue Project" (funded in part by ARC and T-SPLOST). They have hired a consultant from Lord Aeck Sargent. They encourage everyone to check out the new website (https://l5pa.com/), in particular pointing out that the donation portal is now live (https://l5pa.com/show-love). The L5P Alliance Board is looking for volunteers to populate committees on all issues.

Atlanta Beltline, Inc. Lynnette Reid and Nathan Soldat presented updates on the Master Plan; there are 10 neighborhoods involved but we are in Subarea 5 (O4W, PHi and IP): https://beltline.org/wp-content/uploads/2012/01/Atlanta-BeltLine_Subarea-5_MasterPlan.pdf
10 years into this overall project and it is time to update and refresh. Stakeholder Advisory Group has been meeting (4 public meetings, all info available online) and looked at future land use (parcels that are likely to be redeveloped). https://beltline.org/organizer/atlanta-beltline-inc/

VP Public Safety – Kevin Curry (absent) Atlanta Police Department Zone 6 Crime Prevention Inspectors Tillman and Word introduced themselves and presented a new Neighborhood Watch program called Atlanta Police Citizens

VP for Historic Preservation -- Sara Wittich Nothing to report VP for Planning – Rick Bizot presented an overview of the Hulsey Yards Master Plan, including explaining parts of the study available online: https:// hulseymasterplan.com/ and updating the status regarding the involvement of surrounding neighborhoods. The Committee met with Natalyn Archibong (District 5 representative on the Atlanta City Council), who would like all involved neighborhoods to officially vote to support the plan. Connectivity Q: Where will streets connect through to Inman Park besides at Krog and the MARTA station? A: The old connection between Delta Place and Chester Street in Reynoldstown is being explored. A 4-way stop is also planned for the intersection of Euclid and Delta Place, which should slow and make traffic safer in that area.

NPU – Neil Kinkopf (absent)
Beverly Miller reported that a formal
complaint against Vegan in the Park has
been filed with the city, and will give an
update for January.

VP for Zoning – Jonathan Miller Change of agent for liquor license - Bartaco (Jason Clarke) and Barcelona (Kenneth Perlman), represented by Mike Sarge requested a change of agent, based upon new ownership of the two restaurants (L Catterton purchased the franchise from Del Frisco). Nothing (hours, menu, etc.) will change except the agent. Membership voted to approve: 29 in favor, 0 opposed.

Winter at Carter Center Freedom Farmer's Market

Winter at the Freedom Farmer's Market up at the Carter Center is a special time! If you've been skipping it lately because it just seems like a summery activity, let me give you a buncha good reasons to go! I'll copy Jim Abbot and make a New Year's style list:

- 1.) There are fewer people but somehow just as many cute dogs.
- 2.) La Calavera Bakery just started a booth there and they have a carrot-spelt loaf that is just out of this world.
- 3.) You think it's cold but by the time you've walked there you actually feel quite warm.
- 4.) Woodland Farms is turning out perfectly round, bright red radishes, emerald green broccoli, and butter-colored heads of cauliflower.
- 5.) You can then get some creamy, perfect goat cheese from Decimal Place Farms and spread it on toast made from that carrot-spelt bread (see #2) and top it with roasted broccoli (see #4).
- 6.) Franklin Citrus is bringing in gorgeous satsumas and other perfect citrus right now!
- 7.) Salmon guy is usually there once a month! He fishes with his pack of sons all summer in Alaska and then brings it to sell to us all winter. Not only is his fish spectacular and sustainable, he also presents an excellent model of what to do if you produce an excess of boy children.
- 8.) There's a sausage biscuit from Star Provisions that is worth any amount of walking in the cold.
- 9.) Here's what you do--you get ground chicken from Grateful Growers and make larb: cook it in a bit of vegetable oil with two minced garlic cloves, sliced scallions, a few chopped chilies, if you like them. Stir in a tablespoon each of soy sauce, fish sauce, sriracha, and brown sugar and cook until the texture is dry. You can grab butter lettuce or cabbage from Woodland Gardens while you're there--serve the larb piled on a platter surrounded by torn lettuce or cabbage leaves. You scoop it up on the leaves and put it directly in your mouth.
- 10.) Everyone has beets right now. Those can make a date with goat cheese (see #5) and greens or top an oil-roasted salmon filet (see #7) with them and some sliced citrus (see #6).
